

# A Friend from the Beginning

TRIBAL TRAILS' MINISTRY PARTNER AND FRIEND, evangelist Fred Evans, passed away from cancer on March 2 at the age of 72 in Swan River, Manitoba. Fred and his wife, Charlotte, had been guests on our program multiple times over the years. We love and appreciate all of our program guests, but there was something extra special about Fred's partnership with us.

Fred & Charlotte graduated from NCEM's Key-Way-Tin Bible Institute in 1978, about the time our Mission began talking about launching a television outreach. Right after their graduation, the Evanses embarked on a lifetime of ministry. They joined Continental Mission in 1979, moving to Thompson, Manitoba, where Fred served for a time as a pastor, while also visiting outlying communities, including Nelson House and Split Lake.

While based in Manitoba, Fred committed to full-time evangelism, and began traveling to preach in scores of First Nations communities, while producing a regular radio broadcast. He was known as an annointed communicator of the Gospel, using both the Cree and English languages. He used every opportunity to reach people for Christ. For example, when the internet came into use in the North, he began posting articles on a web site geared for young people. "The youth email me with their problems and ask for prayer," Fred had reported.

While proclaiming to many others Christ's offer of salvation, hope, and a changed life, Fred had experienced transformation himself as a young man.

"I grew up in a little place called Thicket Portage, in northern Manitoba," Fred had shared with us on camera. "When I was a little boy I used to go out to the trap-line with my uncle and aunt. I remember bringing with me the Gideons New Testament I'd been given in school. It was all I had to read while out on the trap-line. I read verses in there like John 3:16 and others where the Lord spoke about salvation, but I didn't understand them.

"As a young boy of about 10 or 11, I would go to church, and the minister would get me to read Scripture for him. I would stand on the little box he had for me and read, but I still I didn't know



anything about salvation. Sometimes I would sit at the lake and look across and into the sky. I wondered about this God that the Bible was talking about.

"Then I began going to 'Young Peoples,' led by the local missionaries. Most of the time we would just fool around, as young boys do, but in spite of that we did

learn some things – like how to be saved, and how the Lord loved us. About the time I turned 16 I had a school teacher who would read to us every morning from the Bible. Those were the days when Bible reading was allowed in school. By the end of the year the Lord opened my eyes to see that I could be saved. I asked this teacher how I could go about it, and he led me to the Lord."

Though Fred walked away from the Lord for a time as a young man, when he returned his repentance was genuine. Missionaries who knew him from those days told how he was now a different

man. Fred asked forgiveness for all the trouble he had caused them. He wanted to restore fellowship with the people he had wronged.

What made Fred extra special to us, along with his genuine humble walk with God, was the encouragement he was at the beginning when we launched Tribal Trails. NCEMers Derrick & Jean Hiscox led the effort, but initially there were no First Nations coworkers committed "The Lord opened my eyes to see that I could be saved."

to serve full-time. Though Fred felt called to itinerant preaching, he generously assisted with pilot video recordings and greatly encouraged the Hiscoxes. One day, in between recording sessions, he sat down with his guitar and sang, *"Tribal Trails, Tribal Trails, the Son of God, He is near. He chose to walk with us these Tribal Trails"* ... still our program's theme song with Fred's voice 40 years later!

The COVID-19 pandemic certainly isn't something we would have chosen, but it is bringing improvements to our Tribal Trails ministry which we can carry over into the future.

For our missionary staff, it has resulted in a more hygienic office/studio environment, and we're learning to do more work off site – which helps us get more work done with less travel (and we've had more time to play table games with our families!).

Best of all, we are seeing an increased number of viewers, and our regular viewers are watching more often. One recently wrote to say: "Now that we are in self-isolation, I can watch Tribal Trails at 7:00 am, 7:30 am, 8:00 am, 9:00 am, 10:00 am, 11:00 am, & 11:30 am!" Not everyone across the continent will have the option of this many channels, but we are available for TV viewing in most Canadian homes ... and our programs can be viewed online anytime worldwide.

However, there are still some in Canada, and many in the USA, who cannot receive our program on any of their current TV channels. Trying to ensure that Tribal Trails gets to all homes in Canada is a bit like playing chess while the pieces keep moving. TV cable and satellite providers continue to change the packages that they provide to subscribers.

We appreciate your prayers as we move into more internet avenues that will allow First Nations guests to share the hope they have found in Christ. Please


pray for us as we look for young adults who are interested in partnering with us to create an internet channel.

- "I CURRENTLY AM AN INMATE in the Correctional Centre. I am in the 'overflow,' and we watch you guys (on TV) every week. The boys wanted me to write you a letter of appreciation, as it is a big part of our week in a place where we don't have much to look forward to. I was wondering if you could write back. We have a young lad here who is FASD (Fetal Alcohol). I keep telling him Tribal Trails cares about us. He has no contact with his family and has a tough time. In here he likes to sing with the artists on your program, and a letter would mean a lot to him, as well as the rest of us. Also, some reading material about Christ, if possible. Thank you so much for what you do. Don't stop, and we will be here watching weekly. Thank you." – W.R.
